



From the Pastor's Desk

This is something of a follow-up to last weekend's feast, the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. You may remember that I mentioned a section of the Catechism entitled, "What is this sacrament called?", which lays out the richness of this sacrament we call Eucharist, Sacrifice, Memorial, Mass, etc. I also mentioned the four-fold action of Jesus at the Last Supper, as he "took, blessed, broke & shared", just as we do at Eucharist in remembrance of him.

I find myself also struck with another quote from the catechism which reveals the ancient structure and action of the Eucharist we celebrate. In the year 155, St. Justin Martyr wrote a letter to the emperor, in which he described their "Mass":

"On the day we call the day of the sun, all who dwell in the city or country gather in the same place. The memoirs of the apostles and the writings of the prophets are read, as much as time permits. When the reader has finished, he who presides over those gathered admonishes and challenges them to imitate these beautiful things. Then we all rise together and offer prayers for ourselves... and for all others, wherever they may be, so that we may be found righteous by our life and actions, and faithful to the commandments, so as to obtain eternal salvation. When the prayers are concluded we exchange the kiss. Then someone brings bread and a cup of water and wine mixed together to him who presides over the brethren. He takes them and offers praise and glory to the Father of the universe, through the name of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and for a considerable time he gives thanks (in Greek: eucharistian) that we have been judged worthy of these gifts. When he has concluded the prayers and thanksgivings, all present give voice to an acclamation by saying: 'Amen.' When he who presides has given thanks and the people have responded, those whom we call deacons give to those present the "eucharisted" bread, wine and water and take them to those who are absent."

It is not difficult to see in St. Justin's description the same actions that make up our Eucharist today: Gathering, Liturgy of the Word, Homily, Prayer of the Faithful, Kiss of Peace, Preparation of the Gifts, Eucharistic Prayer, Communion and Dismissal. It is all there. One of the goals of the Second Vatican Council, which were admirably achieved, was to simplify our sacred rites, so that this basic structure could be experienced in a more obvious and beneficial way. You can clearly see the two main parts, the Liturgy of the Word, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This short passage from St. Justin also teaches us about the truly "traditional" nature of our Eucharist, as that which has been handed down to us. Our celebration of the Eucharist is truly the "Mass of the Ages".
